(Old Testament: Part 4)

1. Compare circumcision and Baptism. How are they similar?

Chapter 4

1. Jacob's name means *"deceiver."* God changes his name to Israel which means *"let God be prince."* Explain Jacob's personality change from deceiver to honoring God.

His starving brothers come to Joseph and bow down. Joseph saves his family. God used Joseph to change a tragedy to good. Share how God changed a tragedy into a happy memory in your life.

Chapter 5

1. Suppose you lived with the Israelites in slavery in Egypt. Now imagine your feelings when Moses arrived and told you God will save you and you will soon escape. Write your feelings:
